omewhere along the line, a lot of relationships that started out working fine have gone haywire.

Your Spirit and Your Soul

God has given each of us a *spirit* and a soul. Your spirit is your inner man, and it comes directly from God. Because God is a spirit, He created us with a spirit so we can worship Him fully and completely. When your earthly body dies, it is your spirit that becomes absent

from your body and present with the Lord (2 Corinthians 5:8).

Your *soul* is the realm which includes your mind, your will, your emotions, and your decision-making processes. It is your soul that makes the decision whether to submit to the kingdom of God or not. It is your soul that determines the outcome of your relationships. In other words, *those to whom you tie your soul can influence the direction in which you go.*

God's perfect design for mankind puts the spirit in the position of rulership above the soul. That was His original plan, but Adam showed how hard it can be to keep your spirit in the position God intended.

Spirit Comes Before Soul

When Adam sinned in the Garden of Eden, he allowed his soul to overrule his spirit. Just like Adam, if you begin to listen to your soul instead of your spirit, you can set the stage for making wrong decisions. You may be led by the actions of your mind, will, and emotions, rather than being led by God through your spirit.

Soul Mate or Sour Mate?

When it comes to the close relationships in your life, you knit your soul to another person's as the relationship grows.

You develop a *soul tie*to that person

to that person.

If God's Spirit is ruling your soul and the soul of the person in the relationship, then both of you can be properly led in the decision-making process.

The danger comes when you knit yourself to someone who is not allowing the spirit of God to lead them. That person can pull down your soul so much that they eventually pull down your spirit. *That's a destructive soul tie.*

Even when that friendship or relationship is no longer a part of your life, it can continue to have an influence on your soul.

Breaking the Connection

Perhaps you've left a tough friendship or an abusive situation or gotten out of a bad relationship, thinking that would end your connection with that person. But until you make a conscious decision to ask God to help you break that destructive soul tie off your mind, will, and emotions, that relationship may not be behind you. You could still be carrying the remnants of it with you into the relationships and the decisions you make today.

I believe that when our souls are not right with God, it's difficult to feel, think, perceive, or reason what a right souls are right with relationship should be. But when our God, He can give us souls are right sound, solid judgment with God, He can to make wise, give us sound, solid judgment to godly decisions make wise, godly decisions in every area of our lives-including our relationships.

King David once cried out to God, "Restore to me a right spirit," because he had gotten himself into a sinful mess (see Psalm 51:10). Just as God did with David, He can restore in you a right spirit, a clean

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spirit. And you can have a "clean slate" in the realm of your soul and your spirit to begin again.

Start Right Now

I believe you can get your soul into a right relationship with God right now, as you begin to bless the Lord. Psalm 103:1 says, *Bless the Lord:* O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name.

Your soul was created to magnify the Lord. When you bless the Lord with your total self, you can receive all of His benefits: He can forgive your sins, He can heal all of your diseases, He can redeem your life from destruction, He can surround you with His love and tender mercies, and He can fill you with good things (Psalm 103:3-5).

As you bless the Lord, ask Him to break any destructive soul ties you may have in your life. Then begin renewing your mind daily with the Word of God. You can let the washing of the water of God's Word begin to transform your life as you allow God to speak to your spirit and lead you into creating new and healthy relationships in Him. **

t this time of year, weddings seem to fill everyone's calendar, so let's talk about gifts, showers, and invitations.

How Many Gifts?

Have you ever received invitations to two showers and a wedding, all for the same bride and groom? Obviously you're expected to take a gift, but the question is, How many gifts do you have to give?

Really, you need to give only one gift. The bride should always be very respectful of people's time and money and invite them to only one shower.

Wedding Gift Costs

GRILLED BRATWURST AND VEGGIES

My favorite summer pastime is grilling. I can't get enough of it! I could grill every day and never run out of ideas. My favorites are sausages and veggies.

Ingredients

1 package beer bratwurst (or sausage of your choice) 1 large bundle of asparagus Extra virgin olive oil portobello mushroom caps (or any desired mushrooms) red and yellow bell peppers salt and pepper to taste

Directions

Spray grill when it's off with grill spray or a little oil to keep the brats from sticking. Cut the red and yellow peppers in large pieces, big enough to keep from falling through grill grates.

Toss all the veggies (including mushrooms) in olive oil, salt, and pepper. Do not use too much oil, just enough to coat them lightly.

Toss the veggies on the grill



together next to the brats, for about 10-15 minutes at a medium heat. Keep them moving if places start to scorch. Serve piping hot!

CARROT CAKE

Ingredients

- 1 8oz can of crushed pineapple
- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 2 tsp baking soda
- 1 ½ tsp cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup vegetable or canola oil

2 cups shredded carrots 1 cup chopped walnuts

ICING:

- 2 8oz packages softened cream cheese
- 1/4 cup unsalted butter
- 2 ½ tsp vanilla
- 1 ½ cup confectioner's sugar

Directions

Preheat oven to 350°. Drain the pineapple and save 2 T liquid for the batter. In a medium bowl, combine dry ingredients. Add in the eggs, pineapple, oil, and the reserved 2 T juice. Combine well. Add in the carrots and walnuts. Bake 30-40 minutes in a 9x13 greased baking dish or 20-30 minutes in two round cake pans.

To make icing, beat the butter and cream cheese until smooth, then add vanilla and beat in sugar until light and fluffy.

When the cakes are cool, cover with the icing. If desired, chop walnuts and place them atop the icing, or decorate the cake with <u>marzipan</u> carrots. Enjoy!


worked everything out just perfectly. We closed the sale on the day the house would have gone into foreclosure. I am a living example of what God can do when you plant your seed and expect a miracle!

Oral Roberts has been introducing me as his "darling wife, Evelyn" for over sixty years. That's all I've ever wanted to be—his inspiration, his helpmate, his comfort, his wife, and the mother of his children.

Together, we've learned a great deal about living by faith—not just from God and His Word, but from each other too.

Oral says he has learned some secrets from me that have helped him as a man, a husband and father, and in his calling from God. I share

four of them here because I believe they may be helpful to someone in vour life as well.

1. Put Your Family First

When our healing ministry began in 1947, Oral was so busy that he didn't have much time to spend with our children. He was gone on crusades for three weeks out of every month and, of course, he was exhausted by the time he came home. He would love on the children for a while, but then he would let them go about their own business. And I

could see the effect it was having on them.

Finally, for both Oral's and the children's sakes. I sat down with him and said, "Honey, you're not spending enough time with the children. When they are grown, they're not even going to know you. You've just got to spend time with them when you're home."

"You're right," he said. From then on, Oral tried to spend more time with each of the children—riding horses, fishing, playing golf, whatever they enjoyed. He learned that ministry and work do not come before your family. Your family comes first.

2. Control Your Reactions

I think that if Oral hadn't had a quick reaction, he wouldn't have been able to accomplish all the things that he has done. But at the same time, Oral used to fly off the handle and sometimes say the wrong thing before thinking.

I would tell him, in a loving way and at the right time, "When you have to tell people they're doing something wrong, do it in a calm way. First tell them all the good things they've done, and then say, 'Now here's where you're falling short.' Don't let your reactions take over."

3. Use Good Grammar

I think it's important for anyone who communicates with the public to know how to use the English language properly. When I married Oral, his grammar was not as good as I thought it needed to be. So I said, "Oral, you're going to be talking to millions of people, and you need to use good grammar."

Together, Oral and I took a correspondence refresher course in grammar right after we married, and I think he speaks almost perfect English now.


4. Learn to Receive After Planting Seeds

When Oral and I were growing up, we were taught that when you do something for God, you're not to expect anything back from Him. We thought that would be sacrilegious and against the Bible. But in those days we didn't know Scripture like we do now—verses such as Luke 6:38, in which Jesus says that when you give, God will bless you.

We were planting our seeds of faith, but when God started giving to us, Oral wouldn't accept it. So after a while I told him, "You're teaching people to give and telling them the Lord will give back. If we don't receive what God gives back to us, then we can't teach the people how to receive what God wants to give back to them."

Ever since that time, the Lord has given us outstanding harvests because of the seeds of faith we've planted. It's part of the Bible. And it works! **

One of the most remarkable stories in the Bible is about the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29–37). I believe if there was ever a message designed for you and me today, this is THE message.

The Bible tells us that a man was traveling from Jerusalem to Jericho when he was attacked by a band of thieves. They robbed him, stripped him of his clothing, beat him, and left him half dead on the side of the road. Later, several people passed by the man, and I believe their reactions reveal three different philosophies of life.

1. The Philosophy of the Thieves

The first philosophy belongs to the thieves. They said, "Let's beat the man up!" Now, this is a picture of the devil's crowd. John 10:10 makes it clear that

the thief—the devil—comes to steal, to kill, and to destroy.

Perhaps you haven't been beaten up physically, but you've taken a mental beating or a spiritual beating or a verbal beating. Or maybe someone has assaulted your integrity.

The apostle Paul was also beaten up. He was ridiculed. He was chased out of town. He was shipwrecked, stoned, and left for dead on the side of the road. But that didn't stop him from doing what God called him to do.

If anyone had a right to gripe about his circumstances, it was the apostle Paul. But Paul was God's "can do" man. He said, *I can do all thing through Christ who strengthens me* (Phillippians 4:13). And no matter what he faced, Paul had made up his mind to serve God.

2. The Philosophy of the Priest and the Levite

The priest and the Levite saw the man who had been brutally beaten and left for dead, but they passed by him. They crossed over to the other side of the road. The philosophy of this particular priest and Levite was, "Let's pass him up." They didn't want to get their hands dirty. They were not moved with the compassion of Jesus.

Let me tell you, the philosophy of the priest and Levite will not get the job done in the world today. Our job is to pray for the hurting people and believe God for their salvation.

3. The Philosophy of the Good Samaritan

After the priest and the Levite had crossed over to the other side of the road, a Samaritan came by and saw the man who had been beaten up and left for dead. Immediately he knelt down beside the wounded man and began to treat his wounds. The philosophy of the Good Samaritan was, "I'll lift him up."

It's amazing to me that Jesus used someone in this story whom most people of His day disliked. The Samaritans were half Gentile and half Jewish, so both the Jews and the Gentiles disliked them. That means the one who was the least likely to minister to the wounded man was the one who lifted him up!

The Good Samaritan put the wounded man on his horse, took him to the local inn, got a room for him, and told the innkeeper, "Whatever the bill is, I'll pay it."

I believe God is asking us today, Are we going to refuse to lift up others spiritually because we think it's too hard or too inconvenient? Or are we willing to lift others up, in the Name of the Lord?

Jesus said, "If I am lifted up, I'll draw all people to Me" (John 12:32). Spiritually speaking, I believe when we see someone beaten up and passed up on the roadside of life, we've got to step in and lift them up to Jesus. We're not here on this earth to put people down, but to lift them up, moved by the power and compassion of the Lord Jesus Christ. **
